Suffering Servant

"He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded

for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed." – Isaiah 53:3-5 –

ur Lenten journey began with ashes – and with good cause. They are the reminders of our own mortality, symbols of our own pain and loss and fragility. They

are last year's palms that've met the flames only to wilt and droop and scorch from the heat. Against such fiery orange adversity, the green cannot endure. It withers. It chars. It becomes sooty black. But even there, in the disintegrating ugliness, beauty emerges: a sacred purpose, a holy use. It is the very promise

n just a handful of weeks, our
Confirmands will come forward to
profess their faith in Jesus Christ...
and, if this year is like anything like
the twenty before, I will find myself
profoundly humbled – humbled to get to
be a part of a church like this, humbled
to get to serve a community like this.
There really isn't anything like it: to see
our Confirmands surrounded by so

many laying hands on them, supporting them and encouraging them in their newly confessed faith: friends and family and friends-who-are-like-family. And I am always struck by the liturgy that opens the service: "The Church is of God, and will be preserved to the end of time, for the conduct of worship and the due administration of God's Word and Sacraments, the maintenance of Christian fellowship and discipline, the edification of believers, and the conversion of the world." It is a profound reminder of what it means to be the

Help Wanted Mobile Market Ministry Success Creates Abundance of Need

here's good news and there's bad news.
The good news is the mobile ministry is doing really, really

The bad news is it is doing so well we need a lot more helpers.

Ok, so in reality that's really not bad news; however, as the saying goes, a good problem is still a problem.

For the sake of explaining this good problem, let's back up a bit.

"In 2019, Pastor John [McKellar] told our Outreach Council to "dream big," recalls Lisa Barham, Council Co-Chair, "So, we did!"

During one of their monthly meetings following that challenge, the group started a list of new initiatives they hoped to see come to life. Member Lauren Luke suggested that one of those initiatives be a mobile food pantry.

"The idea was met with excitement and enthusiasm, and we immediately knew this initiative was needed," said Barham. "We just had to find a way to make it happen."

Luke researched the cost and got a bid for a trailer from a company in San Antonio, and the project journey was on its way.

Then came the spoiler—for everything. COVID hit.

"Not only did this dream get put on hold, but the world was also put on hold," Barham said. "Church services went online, everything we knew as a church was put through a test. But, God prevails in all things and at the end of 2021, we came back with a surplus to end the year. I didn't wait, as soon as I knew that money might be available, I asked Pastor John, 'can we dream big again and purchase a mobile food pantry?' His smile was my answer, but I waited to hear the words."

"We had an amazing year. Let's make this happen," McKellar said.

So they did.

Barham describes herself as a "great dreamer; but it takes an organizational

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of Scripture: that God trades beauty for ashes (Isaiah 61:3).

It's not a fair trade, to be sure. But God doesn't count the cost. He only counts the consequence. He only counts the lives that are changed and the souls that are saved by the grace He came to give. But it was a gift purchased in the currency of suffering: redemption in the coinage of pain. Forty tempting days. Thirty silver shekels. Twenty-four dirty feet. One rugged cross.

Beyond every expectation of who the Messiah was "supposed" to be, Jesus came as a Man of sorrows, as One acquainted with grief and rejection. He came not as One immune from pain, but as One empowered to transform it. For it was in suffering that Jesus redeemed suffering – all suffering: in mind and body and soul. From the inside, He knew how it felt. And that, too, is good news. It means that God knows what to do about loss. It means that God knows what to do about grief. It means that God knows what to do about fear and loneliness and the dire emptiness that we so often feel.

It is good news because it's perhaps the most ancient question asked by humankind: "Why do we have to suffer?" If God is so good and heaven so kind,

then why is there such pain and needless violence around us (and within us)? If God is so loving and heaven so sublime, then why do hearts break with such godless regularity and why do we know the salty taste of our tears?

These are questions that defy answers - at least, from the outside of suffering for empty words provide little relief when shouted from a distance. And to cling to the hope that God really is good and all-powerful seems, sometimes, to be impossible. It is the reality of the human condition. It is the tidal wave that grows from Eden's ripple.

But Jesus never distanced Himself from suffering. He entered it willingly. For you and for me, He entered it. And conquered it. And rose beyond it to give us hope. To give us healing. To give us peace. He carried our sorrows because we weren't strong enough. He carried our fears because we weren't brave enough. It was from inside the storm that Jesus tamed the waves. It was from inside the darkness that Jesus showed the light. For it is this Messiah – anointed by blood and water flowing down – who offers us a way, not to avoid pain and trial and temptation, but a way to overcome them from the inside.

And in all of this (and in so much more), we need to give thanks to our Savior for enduring the sacrifice of Calvary for us – we, who dare to call ourselves his Church!

leashes to walk, run, ride, skip and hop to the finish line! Helmets are required for bike and scooter riders. Free T-shirt with registration by April 18.




what's true in our wild world today. Pointing them toward God, True North **VBS** shows them that we can always trust in Him. He's our True North!



talent I do not possess to make such a huge task become reality. I started praying for God to provide someone with the skills needed to make this come to life."

"The first month, the mobile pantry committee was Pastor Sterling [Smith] and myself. Then, Pastor Sterling sent me an email he received from one of our church members, Mike Nelson, who saw an article in the *Herald* about this new ministry. Mike was getting ready to retire and wanted to get involved in a ministry he was passionate about! I'd never met Mike, but I wanted to hug him and thank him as soon as I read the email. Things started moving quickly when Mike came on board."

Barham was tasked with getting new quotes for a trailer or a truck and figuring out which would be the best option. Many hours were spent on figuring out if the ministry need was a trailer or truck. They called on a food industry expert, Mark Mednansky (another church member), to help them figure out what was needed in the trailer: the types of equipment, the number of refrigerators and food racks, and the shapes and sizes needed for everything.

"With Mark's help, our committee grew to four people and it was getting exciting," said Barham. "The four of us went to San Antonio and saw Joshua Davies, who heads up a food truck company named "Cruising Kitchens." We were given a tour and instinctively knew they could provide what we needed. Pastor Sterling signed the contract to purchase a 28' trailer and handed over a deposit."

The WC Mobile Market Ministry was born.



Sept. 22, 2022 was the first run of the Mobile Market. The initial objective was to deliver groceries to families from O.H. Stowe Elementary. They planned on servicing approximately 150 families, one time per month as a beginning to this ministry. Over time, they hoped to eventually reach out to other areas and to provide the service more frequently. The church had an incredible group of volunteer leaders who spent tireless hours planning, organizing and learning how to make this ministry a success. Hundreds of "behind the scenes" hours went into preparing for this first mobile food pantry event.

Needless to say, with all the effort and all the prayers, the ministry was a hit.

Since that time, Barham has continued to lead the ministry. A few additions have been made.

"The church purchased a 40' trailer," she said, "and gracious members from our wonderful church have donated two new trucks that we use to pull the trailer, and the flatbed trailer that we use to pick up the food from Tarrant Area Food Bank (TAFB) in Fort Worth."

She does, however, attribute 'everything running smoothly' to three very important people.

"Mike Nelson has been there from the beginning," she said. "Mike set up the structure for the Mobile Market and works with TAFB (the agency that provides the food for our markets). Beverly Chernoff organizes volunteers for our registration and traffic teams. Finally, Mark Mednansky organizes the distribution of the food to our clients. Mark is also the most positive person on planet earth! The four of us complement each other and bring unique talents to the ministry."

Fast forward to present day, and we are back to our good problem.

"To date, we have provided food for

over 37,000 people," reports Barham. "This is amazing to me, but it is just a drop in a bucket. The most important thing we've learned in this two-and-a-half years is that the need in our area is huge. Tarrant County has 20 school districts with 572 public schools. Enrollment is 72% minority and 55% are economically challenged. This means at least 55% of the families we serve are living in poverty. The janitors, nurses, counselors and most teachers in the schools we serve also qualify for food programs."

"We have been adding a new location every 6-7 months, but to continue growing the ministry we need more volunteers. That's the only thing that holds the ministry back because the need to feed more people in our area is stronger than ever."

In addition to O.H. Stowe, the ministry now partners with GRACE in Grapevine on the 2nd Thursday at the Mustang (Grapevine High School) stadium parking lot. The 3rd Thursday finds them at T.A. Sims Elementary School in Fort Worth across from White's Chapel's mission church, Le Mesa. And each 4th Thursday, the group provides food for families in Watauga at the Grace E. Hardeman Elementary School.

"In addition to our TAFB partnership, we partner with GRACE to help expand their outreach to people within Grapevine and surrounding communities. The ministry benefits families within Tarrant County. We primarily work with schools to find the families in need."

The schedule is pretty structured. "We arrive at our locations around 4:45 p.m., set up and are ready to serve our guests around 5:15 p.m.," Barham said. "We are normally finished and packed up before 6:30 p.m. During that time, we've fed an average of 200 families. We continue to need more volunteers and would love to have anyone interested join us on

Thursday evenings."

Barham now dreams that corporations in our community will get involved and work with our church and TAFB to reach more schools. "The mobile market leadership team would love to teach companies and their employees —as volunteers— how to set up a new school and feed more people. If we had local

corporations helping us, we could make a huge difference in people's lives. I hate the thought of people going to bed hungry, especially children."

She also dreams of having our first brick and mortar food pantry around Le Mesa's community center. "This will take longer to achieve but, if we can make it work, we can feed that community 5-6 days a week, not just one Thursday once a month."

"Tarrant Area Food Bank feeds 62 MILLION meals each year," she added. "These include 13 counties all in our backyard. Our church helps as much as we can to bring awareness to TAFB's needs. We [White's Chapel] held our first Annual Car Show last October and all donations went to TAFB; we were able to raise over \$23,424 that one day. Every dollar provides 5 meals, so in one afternoon, our church helped to provide food for 117,120 people. Just imagine what we could do if we had more people within our community and congregation helping to stop hunger in our little part of the world! The sky's the limit, and I'm going to keep looking up for direction."

Barham's passion continues to be infectious.

"I know in my heart this is what God is calling me to do. I'm supposed to help feed people that are hungry and who need additional resources to make ends meet. I ask God every day to put people in my path that I can help. Be careful what you ask for... I asked, and God sent me a trailer! My goal is to keep that trailer on the road, full of food, heading to a new local school as often as we can find enough volunteers to help make this happen."
