Embodied: A Lenten Prayer Experience

Monday, April 14– Thursday, April 17 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Friday, April 18 10 a.m. to Noon

uring Holy Week, White's
Chapel will offer a variety of
different prayer experiences
to engage people's minds and
bodies as they focus on the significance
of this holy season.

"The Embodied experience is an opportunity for those visiting our campus to encounter the quiet spaces necessary for contemplation and prayer," said Rev. Victor Resendiz, Pastor of Spiritual Formation. "Each space provides three essential elements to our prayer life that Jesus modeled throughout the Gospels: silence, stillness, and solitude."

Six different independent prayer stations will be available Monday, April 14—Thursday, April 17 from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Friday, April 18 from 10 a.m. to noon. Stations will include aspects of movement as well as contemplative ideas at each prayer station. Participants are invited to bring their journals to record their divine inspirations. While there will be a guide available at each station, there is no right or wrong way to

Columbarium and Memorial Garden Expands Space and Expense

n the past few years, White's Chapel has expanded the Columbarium and Memorial Garden.

Located on the west end of the church campus behind the Ponder Prayer Chapel, the area is completely built out, with a total of 720 niches, according to Rev. Kyle Roberson, Pastor and Director of Care and Support.

"Establishing a resting place for those we love is imperative not only for us but for friends and family who are grieving," said Roberson. "In an era when people might call many cities 'home' over a lifetime, choosing a poignant, permanent, and meaningful location can be challenging."

Mary Martha Group Assists in 2025

Missions and Outreach Goals

n a recent White's Chapel administrative board meeting, board members established numerous strategic goals for the year in various areas of church and community involvement, including Missions and Outreach.

The areas of Missions and Outreach specifically addressed hopes to expand connections with Methodist Collegiate Churches in Africa (Kenya); to begin work on the La Mesa Community Center which was also a part of the capital campaign; to expand the use and reach of the Mobile Market ministry; to offer a more robust slate of mission experiences and opportunities for participation by White's Chapel adults locally, nationally, and internationally; and to deepen the partnership of the church with GRACE to confront regional issues of homelessness, poverty, food insecurity, and health.

Of those goals, perhaps it is the hope of working with our partners at GRACE that offers the most frequent opportunities of service for volunteers.

GRACE does an amazing job helping Individuals and Families transition from homelessness through different programs based on need. While GRACE

he other night, as the windswept clouds parted for just a moment, I went outside. The air was clear and thick—heavy with the smells of spring. And I looked up. The stars of the night sky seemed to twinkle against the indigo sky. The moon was crisp and bright; and there, in that pale light, I took a deep breath. In. Out. In. Out. I was rapt with the awareness that the same God who flung the heavens into place, the same God who calls the stars by name knows mine. And as I continued looking up, I saw it: a star brighter than all the others out past the horizon. Unsure of what it was, I pulled out my phone and opened my "Star Chart" app.

It was Venus. Venus! Without a telescope—without even my glasses—I was watching Venus. Long the object of childlike fascination, the planet gleamed, suspended in the deep darkness of space. And I got curious: how far away was our planetary neighbor? Just how far were my eyes seeing? So, again, I turned to my phone. On average, it told me, the distance from Earth to Venus is over 26 million miles—that's 137,280,000,000 feet! With eyes bare and unaided, with eyes unstrained, I was seeing Venus.

And that's when it struck me: a thought that's lingered with me, now, for days. Through all the "adventures" of last week, through all the ups and downs, it's something that's been on my mind. Venus produces no light of its own; it

merely reflects the light of the sun. Over a journey of hundreds of millions of miles, though all the heavy darkness, it shines not of itself; Venus simply shines because of the sun-bouncing the sun's rays and directing them down to Earth.

That's not where the thought stopped, though. It reminded me that the call of Christ is for us to do the exact same thing: to reflect the light of the Son so that others—even from a distance—may see. Though we try, we can't (for long) manufacture our own light. We can't produce its warmth or glow. We can't create its shine. In Ms. Wharton's words, we can't be the candle.

But the good news is this: we were never supposed to be. We were not created to be the source of the Light, just its bearers... not the Maker, but the mirror—reflecting God's grace and compassion, his mercy and love into all the world around.

Inurnment in the White's Chapel Columbarium and Memorial Garden allows members of White's Chapel Methodist Church and their families to choose to designate their church, which has been a source of peace and support throughout their lives, as their final resting place. However, as we continue to provide this sacred space of rest and reflection, the costs of its upkeep and the rising prices in the world around us necessitate periodic increases.

Considering these realities, the price of purchasing a niche will increase to \$4,000 as of May 1, 2025. This price includes an inurnment service officiated by a White's Chapel pastor, the single niche and two urns (pewter or gold toned), engraving of the granite faceplate and perpetual care of the Garden. This cost also allows White's Chapel to remain committed to providing a beautiful space for loved ones and families for years to come.

Representatives from the Columbarium Committee will be available in the concourse on Sunday, April 6, and Sunday, April 27 from 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., to answer any questions and to provide a printed version of our Columbarium packet. under the belief that the most effective way to disrupt poverty is to work with parents and children equally and simultaneously, so that transformation lasts into the next generation.

Without housing security, women and their children don't feel safe enough to envision a future. Because many families who experience homelessness have been impacted by trauma, the Center's approach is to understand what happened to the individual and to their family members, in order to help them heal and move forward.

these families, financial wellbeing and emotional well-being are equal parts of the whole. The structure of the Center addresses both, equally and systematically, to create a cycle of well-being for the whole family. The agency was founded in 1907

> by Fort Worth women as the first Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) to serve local lowincome women. In those early years, services included housing, employment supports and

social activities. Since that time services have grown to include education and emotional support.

Each month, 100% of the money received through communion offerings is donated directly to the chosen agency.

organizes help with many aspects of homelessness, housing is the major emphasis for White's Chapel's Home with a Heart Project, managed by our Mary and Martha group.

"Home with a Heart has worked with GRACE on Mentorship Housing for over eight years!" said Martha Reukema, one of Mary and Martha's group leaders. "Mentorship Housing allows individuals and families the stability, comfort, and safety of their own residence for up to two years while they work or attend educational opportunities towards selfsufficiency."

The Mentorship Housing Program is 24 months in length. In addition to meeting other needs, GRACE may help with 3 months of rent.

"We appreciate all the hard work it takes from GRACE to vet the families and get them to where they need to be to leave homelessness behind them and be on their own," said Reukema.

The Mary and Marthas have worked with additional homeless transitioning programs and have already completed three apartments this year. They were to have completed the fourth on March 21.

"Our Mary and Martha's Group purchased."

Reukema explains that most of the new residents come with very little. "The next family we will serve lost their home and contents in a fire and have been couch surfing at the homes of friends. We hope to get them in their 'new' home by early April. We are usually asked to complete a request within five to seven days, but this apartment needs some repairs and will take a little longer."

Donations are usually obtained through Sign Up Genius. Notifications of a virtual shower are made through emails to Mary and Martha, Tuesday emails to the church, Tuesday Bible Study announcements and Women's Ministry Friday emails depending on how much time is given to complete the project.

"Gifts, such as furniture, may be gently used, but others must be new because of formal regulations," added Reukema. "Collection boxes are by Evans Hall and the Administrative Building Lobby. No time to shop? Let us do your shopping! Walmart gift cards help fill the voids and we have volunteers to do the shopping for you!"

Progress since December has been very heart-warming: "We have ended homelessness for four households for a total of 15 people. And we have two more families to help in the next two to three weeks!"

Donations are also accepted between virtual showers and can be stored for the next shower.




Mission Mania Sunday, May 4 12:15-1:30 p.m.



go through the experiences; participants are encouraged to let the Holy Spirit guide them.

Spell Chapel: Prayer Stones

An outdoor prayer opportunity will be available at Spell Chapel, located in the southwestern part of the main parking area. Smooth stones will be available there for participants to use as they pray. Sharpie pens will also be available so people can write their prayers on the stones. The stone can then be placed at the altar—a representation of laying a prayer at the feet of the Lord. These prayer stones will be stacked on top of one another and left as a symbol of surrender.

Indoor Labyrinth

An indoor prayer labyrinth will be available for use in The Foundry. As individuals walk through the meandering path, they will be able to pray for things placed on their heart. Through physical movement, individuals are able to unlock concerns within their mind. While there is no specific or correct way to walk a labyrinth, participants are encouraged to walk through it slowly, allowing the mind to process thoughts and emotions. Once in the center of the labyrinth, individuals may stay as long as they would like, finally turning and walking back through the path.

Outdoor Labyrinth

An additional prayer labyrinth will be (and is always) available outside near the Center for Spiritual Care on the northern side of the campus. Here, individuals may pick up a stone at the entrance and hold it as they walk through the

shaded path. Although there is only one path in and out of the labyrinth, there are multiple turns—the same number of turns to the right and to the left. Walking this well-balanced path activates both sides of the brain. This calming practice can often give people clarity of mind and peace. Once in the center of the labyrinth, participants can put down the stone. Then, if they choose, they can pick up another person's stone (representing a prayer request or burden) and carry it out of the labyrinth.

Gallery: Mandalas

The Gallery, located in front of the main Sanctuary, will be a mandala prayer station. The act of coloring a mandala can bring focus and anchor an individual in an awareness of God's presence. It symbolizes one's entrance into the center of God's loving Spirit and creates a prayer space.

Parlor: Examen

The Parlor will provide a space of invitation to engage a prayer practice of self-examination through deep reflection. The Examen provides an opportunity to discern in God's wisdom and to become aware of God's loving grace.

Grace Chapel: Visio Divina

Visio Divina (divine seeing) is a way of praying with the eyes; a spiritual practice that invites an encounter with the Divine through visual images such as paintings, photos, and other visual representations. Participants enter this moment of prayer as they gaze upon the oil on canvas painting titled 'Christ Crucified.'

"The most important part of this Embodied experience," said Resendiz, "is that it prepares our hearts for both the lament of Good Friday and the celebration of Easter Sunday."

faithful meet, that the peace and promise of our Lord is proclaimed. But it's not the brick or mortar or steel that holds the Church together. She is no building or space or room.

The Church is the living, breathing family of God; she is the vast connection of his faithful followers—saints and sinners bound together under a common banner: the love of the Savior.

Mortar crumbles. Steel bends, and bricks turn to dust. And just as easily, the Church too can unravel. Under a scourge of backbiting and rancor, we can forget our purpose. Divided into factions and groups and cliques, we can stray. And far from being that safe port in the storms of this life, for too many, the Church can become just another squall—just another wave that threatens our sinking raft. And it ought not be that way.

The cross of Jesus Christ was meant to

call all to repentance; it was intended to beckon all to faith. Crowned with a sign etched in Hebrew, Latin, and Greek, it proclaimed to all—

Jew and Greek, insider and outsider—that He was King. It demolished every barricade and tore down every wall.

Why, then, is the Church so intent upon building them back up? Why can she not, does she not build bridges instead of barriers?

In a world divided into parties and groups, into winners and losers, left and right, haves and have-nots, the Church must be that place where all can come together to hear the Good News. It must be a place where we are reminded that the anger and divisiveness of this world do not get to win. Here, we come

together to be about a purpose bigger and nobler than any one group or idea. The Church must be a people of healing and hope, a people who may not agree on anything else, but who can agree on this one thing: that Jesus is Lord of all.


