The “Now and Always,” campaign seeks to raise funds for several projects connected to White’s Chapel and the WC campus. The projects feature addressing the need for infrastructure, renovating both the Sanctuary and the Foundry, and building additional spaces to address needs for our children, our students, and our community.

After all the open discussion, the decision to proceed is finally here. Going forward depends upon the financial commitment made by the congregation in the initial pledge campaign, which will conclude Sunday, Feb. 23. The amount pledged by that date will determine the extent to which the church pursues these dreams.

In these last few weeks, we hope to relay the hopes and dreams of the staff and volunteers who will be charged with making decisions to implement the congregation’s financial commitment. This week’s emphasis is on WC Students and WC Kids.

A prayer walk for the campaign is planned for Feb. 16.

WC Student Facilities Expand for an Explosion of Opportunity

The proposed Capital Campaign for Student Ministry is a game-changer when it comes to providing students with the right environment to grow spiritually, emotionally, and socially. Right now, space constraints limit the full potential of what’s possible, but with these new additions, spaces will be created where students feel supported, challenged, and connected in ways that were previously out of reach.

“One of the biggest benefits of the proposed changes is the creation of dedicated spaces for small groups and relationship-building,” said Michelle Joseph, Co-Director for WC Students. “Small groups are a vital part of a student’s journey, and having a comfortable, intimate setting will allow for deeper connections, honest conversations, and personal growth. Whether it’s a small group discussing life’s big questions or students connecting over shared experiences, having the right environment to foster

Mission Trips will be Focus of February Communion Offering

The February Communion offering will be focused on providing supply funds for two upcoming mission trips: **the Adult Mission Trip to Guatemala Feb. 8–14; and the Family Mission Trip March 15–21 to Hot Springs, Arkansas.**

In Guatemala, the group will be working with an orphanage, caring for children and helping with their living spaces. Those traveling to Arkansas



will work on construction-based restorations to existing homes of elderly individuals and low-income families in the Hot Springs area.

While the individuals who attend the trips pay for their own lodging, meals, and transportation, White’s Chapel provides the funds for the materials used in the rebuilding that takes place on each trip.

White’s Chapel Presents Winter Warms Up with Todd Suttles Concert

White’s Chapel’s own Todd Suttles will be live for a one-night concert on Sunday, Feb. 2 at 5 p.m. in the Sanctuary. The concert is open to the public. No tickets are required.

Suttles is a member of the Gaither Vocal Band, joining as a new baritone singer in 2014. He came to the group from Vanderbilt University, where he served for 20 years as a Sports Fitness Director. He also served as Vanderbilt’s CampVandy Youth Programs Director. He holds both a BA degree and a MA of Science in Health, Wellness and Recreation from Middle Tennessee State University.

“After 21 years in sports, God had a new direction for me,” said Suttles. “I went from developing bodies to prepare for NFL, NBA, WNBA, Olympics, and anything else you could think of that needed to be bigger stronger and faster to developing souls by spreading the good news of the Gospel.”

Suttles, who now lives in the DFW area, grew up in Lafayette, Georgia, a little town in North Georgia just south of the

Foundry Services Feature Student Takeover

In 2019, a global analysis survey by the Barna Group and World Vision reported that many young people admit to having a natural desire to create positive change in the world, yet they claim that the local church does not show interest in, or support for, their efforts.

How do we as a church reach the next generation and empower them to showcase their faith? By committing to grow each other’s faith despite age and cultural differences. Scripture reminds us that God is a God of generations. In Exodus 3:15, God says He is “the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob,” and Psalms 145:4 proclaims, “generation after

generation will declare more of your greatness... and glory.”

White’s Chapel students are confidently embracing this ideal by hosting “WC Student Takeover.” For the second consecutive year, White’s Chapel students will fully lead the Foundry’s

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Tennessee boarder. He was the fourth child of seven children.

“As a child, my parents had us in church every Wednesday and Sunday and sometimes again on Sunday night,” he explained, “and every day of the week if there was a revival! Farming was our life, and singing was our ministry as children. My father taught us that only what you do for Christ will last.”

He was certain that fitness would be his ‘thing.’ “I was a Former World Powerlifting Champion and World Record holder and an eight-time national champion,” he laughed, “but God has a great sense of humor and I'm the type of guy who had to learn it the hard way.”

“I really didn't have a plan for music,” he said.

“Music has always been a part of worship for me. My parents made sure we knew that God was the center of our music and the voice and musical talents were given to us for God’s glory—not ours. I worked at a great university with a flourishing youth program reaching higher and higher, but the good Lord had a different plan.”

While working in fitness, Suttles sang on the praise and worship team at his church while also doing background vocals and studio recordings for musicians in Nashville. One day while in a session with songwriter Buddy Green, (*Mary Did You Know*) Green told Suttles the Gaither Vocal Band had an opening

for a singer.

“Not having formal training or a professional music background it would only be a God thing if I became a Vocal Band Member, but Buddy suggested I try out for the position,” Suttles said. “To me, this would be like going from a Little League baseball player to the Major Leagues. But God Happened and nine years later here I stand. Only by the grace of God.”

As for finding White’s Chapel, Suttles was working out in a local gym when White’s Chapel choir member

Jim Walters approached him. “He said I looked like the guy who sings for the Gaither Vocal Band,” said Suttles. “I told him I was the guy, and we continued to talk about gospel music. During the conversation he told me he attended White’s Chapel and invited me to come visit. The next day he set up a meeting with the music staff. My

family and I were met with such a warm welcome and an introduction to the church.”

He and his wife Michelle have a daughter, Arrae, who has also been featured in the church music program. They became members at White’s Chapel in 2022. His deep resonant voice is matched only by his quick sense of humor, infectious joy and authenticity.

those relationships is key.”

The space will also be designed to create a welcoming atmosphere—an environment that feels like a second home for students, especially those who may feel isolated or disconnected. This welcoming atmosphere, combined with intentional community-building efforts, can break down walls and allow students to feel seen, heard, and valued.

“For students who struggle with anxiety or need a quieter space to recharge, this new space will be a haven,” added Joseph. “The design will offer calm, low-stimulation areas where they can retreat, reflect, or simply feel safe when things get overwhelming. This flexibility in space allows for more inclusivity, ensuring that every student, regardless of where they are in their emotional journey, can participate at their own pace.”

Joseph also explains that the new gym will be “a transformative addition for students, especially when it comes to creating opportunities for energetic students to get their energy out and engage with others in a fun, low-pressure setting. Right now, we’re limited by the current space and the need to wait for good weather to do outdoor activities like basketball, volleyball, or even just running around. This new gym would give students the space to play those games indoors, rain or shine, and engage in physical activities that promote teamwork, discipline, and fun.”

This is not just about the physical benefits. Games like basketball, dodgeball, or volleyball also provide an incredible opportunity to build relationships. “Sports naturally bring people together and create a shared experience where students can learn about trust, communication, and collaboration in an environment that’s less intimidating than some other settings,” said Joseph. “A casual game of basketball, for example, might be the perfect opportunity for a student to connect with others they wouldn’t have otherwise interacted with, or for students to bond over a shared love of the game. The new gym can serve as a space where connections form naturally, without the pressure of structured events or formal settings.”

Beyond that, the proposed gym gives room for fun, healthy competition and teamwork, which are both great for relationship-building and personal development. For students who are less likely to engage in typical youth group activities, a more relaxed setting where they can feel physically active, social, and engaged may be just the way to get them involved and make lasting connections.

The combination of a welcoming space for group interaction, the ability to engage in physical activities, and the safe spaces for students to manage anxiety will help create a holistic environment for students. These spaces will allow students to belong, grow, and express themselves—whether that’s through meaningful conversations, healthy competition, or just having a space to call their own.

“Ultimately, the Capital Campaign’s additions will not just give students more physical space—they will create opportunities for growth, relationships, and a sense of community that fosters personal and spiritual development,” said Joseph. “This is about meeting students where they are, providing them with what they need to thrive, and allowing them to engage in ways that feel natural, safe, and meaningful to them.”



WC Kids, Busting at the Seams, Moves into Current Student Spaces

As many of our staff and parents can attest, Sunday School Classes, Vacation Bible School, Festivals, and various monthly activities for different school age groups are currently maxed out. And with WC Students moving into a new space, WC Kids can expand into Students’ current spaces.

“Gaining the upstairs floor of the student education building would allow us to move Club 56 (5th and 6th graders) into that space on Sunday mornings and add several elements to our growing preteen ministry,” said Hannah Robbins, Co-Director of WC Kids. “It has been a dream of ours for the last several years to bring back a large group worship time



for Club 56 that may include live music, media, and of course lots of fun and games (similar to the ROCK but geared toward older kids) but we haven’t had a space to do this. This would finally make tis dream come true!”

Utilizing the upstairs floor of the current student building then allows for more room to expand the younger elementary age groups downstairs. “We will gain more Sunday school classrooms, which will help us keep class sizes manageable so that kids and volunteers both have a great experience,” added Robbins.

One of the biggest dreams is to have a WC Kids work room on campus.

“This dedicated work area would keep us from having to close classrooms during preparation for VBS, Festivals, Eggstravaganzas and more,” explained Robbins. “Over the years, we have built 20-foot castles, underwater coral reefs,



glowing outer space habitats, rolling rivers down the concourse, and more. To build all these exciting things, it would be wonderful to have a dedicated area to leave things set up as we work from day to day since it takes months of work. These things often also include power tools, painting, and lots of supplies that we currently have to pick up and put away each week to be able to have class on Sunday.”

Arts Academy Expansion also Becomes Possible

The after-school program for K–6 grade is, like everything else, operating at its maximum. Registration for the program is practically filled the moment it is open. New classrooms provided for WC Kids become available during the week for the Tuesday after school classes in dance, cooking, art, Legos as well as opening opportunity for additional classes.

Finally, the train stopped, and the other gentleman got up from his spot to deboard the train. Douglas Adams recalls that this stranger gave him a look of confusion, and then a smile and head nod. Douglas gave him a disapproving look, shrugged his shoulders, and returned to his papers.

A few stops later and it was time for him to get off the train. And as he did that, he gathered up his stack of papers and saw, hiding under them, was a package of unopened cookies... his cookies.

In that moment, he had a massive change of perspective about the man seated next to him. He went from thinking he had been sitting next to this unbearably rude, inconsiderate person to realizing that, in fact, he was the rude, inconsiderate person.

It’s so easy for us to judge others. And so often, we do it without all the facts. We see someone post something on social media. We see how they dress or hear the way they speak. And we immediately draw far reaching conclusions. And yet, we expect others


to see the depth and intricacies of our own lives: They should understand us being short tempered or impolite because we’ve had a terrible day.

That’s a lesson Jesus shares with us in Matthew. In **Matthew 7:1-3** he says, “*Do not judge, or you too will be judged. For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you. “Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother’s eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye?”*

Jesus tells us that we will be judged in the way that we judge. That’s something to think about. Knowing how flawed I am, and how often I make mistakes, I know that I want to be judged with lots and lots of grace. Which means that I need to offer lots and lots of grace.

One of the best things anyone ever shared with me was the idea that people often are how they are for a reason. It’s an obvious statement. But it helped me reframe the way I see people... Maybe they’ve been hurt in their past. Maybe they’re going through something I’m not aware of. Maybe the difficulties and circumstances of their lives are so different from my own that I could never truly understand. Maybe the cookies they’re eating aren’t actually mine...

It’s like Douglas Adams shows us, there’s always more to the story.

contemporary weekend service. However, unlike last year, they will take over not one, but two services!

Students will be leading both Foundry services on Saturday, Feb. 1, at 5:30 p.m. and Sunday, Feb. 2, at 11 a.m. From the tech team to worship, and from the welcome team to preaching, WC students will be in charge. Additionally, instead of repeating last year’s independent sermon style, high school seniors Vivi Parker, Maria Mazey, Chris Parsons and Gavin Munroe will each deliver a brief message to conclude WC’s current main sermon series, Uphill Habits: A New Direction for a New Year.

Evangelism pastor Rev. Sam Robbins shared that a significant part of his call to ministry was rooted in the realization that he, too, had a role to play and something to contribute personally to the kingdom of God, even as a young man. Allowing him to develop the confidence to believe

that, regardless of age, he also could participate in God’s work.

“One of my biggest hearts behind WC Student Takeover,” Robbins expresses, “is that I want the church to see that the students aren’t the future of the church, they are the church. Right now... there’s so much that they’re currently offering, and I want the whole church to see that.” He added, “Too often we tell our students, ‘One day you’ll be leaders in the church,’ when really they already are leaders in the church.”

The next generation is a part of the body; they are the church, not they will be. There is no junior Holy Spirit. We empower the next generation by showing up, praying for them and equipping them with truth in love. 1 Timothy 4:12 encourages young believers not to be “intimidated by those who are older than you; [but instead] be the example they need to see by being faithful and true in all that you do. Speak the truth and live a life of purity and authentic love as you remain strong in your faith.”

Friends and family are invited and encouraged to attend one of the services and to support their students. To the church body and community at large, Rev. Robbins implores, “Come on out. Y’all are in for a treat. Their services are so powerful. The Holy Spirit will show up. It was such a spirit-filled service last year, and it will be again.”
